FROM THE PRESIDENT:

On behalf of all members, I would like to thank the stalwarts of our Association who unselfishly give hours of time and energy to make our courses possible. For example, Gloria Watson, our course co-ordinator, who arranges all of the invited speakers and topics for each term, and Betty Siegman who prepares this Newsletter.

Others are no longer on the Committee, but even so, make our sessions possible. Where would we be on Mondays and Fridays without Tom Marish and Tommy Thomas, who come early to set up the projector and computer equipment?

Then there are the members who run our special interest groups, French, Singing, Movie Appreciation, Creative Writing, and many others. Each one of them gives time and effort to keep the courses running.

So on behalf of us all, hearty thanks to everyone who gives time and effort so that our U3A can operate.

And while we are on the topic, could you lend a hand? Small practical things can make a lot of difference. Have you noticed Jayne Davis quietly setting up and then packing away the PA system and the speaker's lapel microphone? If you are willing to plug leads into the computer or the projector, let Tom know! He needs one or two apprentices to handle things when he cannot attend.

We are a small U3A, compared with many others. Central Coast U3A (at Gosford) has over 850 members, Lake Macquarie over 650, Eastlakes over 450, and Hunter about 400. More our size is Port Stephens, with 220 members, and Cessnock.

At the end of 2010, our membership was about 155, and we will probably reach the same figure this year. At the beginning of each year, about 110 members renew. During the year, about 50 new members join. Half of the new members renew the following year, and a quarter become long term members.

Why do we lose half our new members? Perhaps we need a wider range of courses? But on what subjects, and who will volunteer to run them?

COURSE CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT:

We have a variety of speakers to please a range of tastes in Term 2.

There are three presentations by members, Jayne Davis, Rita Richards and a new member, June Goss. Jayne reminisces with inside experience on an era we all remember, 'The Early Days of Television' and Rita poses another historical question, this time, 'Was Tutankhamun Murdered?'

In 1975 June Goss took a one-year scholarship to study at Moscow State University. Ten years later there was another year's study at the Pushkin Institute in Russia. This was followed by work as an English translator at Radio Moscow. Since the collapse of the USSR, June has returned frequently to spend time with friends. If you would like to see another side of the kopek, come and listen to June.

Our first speaker in Term 2 is one whose knowledge we could all benefit from. Kevin White is going to speak on his area of expertise and inform us about 'Wills – the current law affecting testators and executors'.

In a truly different field, Jen Dwarte is an Environmental Project Officer at the Community Environment Network on the Central Coast and will speak with authority on a project called 'Stepping Stones' which aims to enhance the wildlife corridor between Wyrabalong National Parks, North and South.

Another speaker new to us is Rodney Russell, who has a passion for music, particularly 'standards'. His presentation will focus on songs inspired by or set in events of history. Each song will be preceded by a brief explanation of the events that surrounded or inspired the song.

We finish Term 2 on rather a more serious note with a series of three talks by Colin Wilks, 'The History, Philosophy and Politics of Work in Australia, 1930-2011'. He examines the phenomenon of 'work' or paid employment and focuses in particular on how attitudes to work have changed over the last eighty years and how they may continue to change.

The course examines the macro-economic and political underpinnings of work that most workers take for granted, un-employment and under-employment and the notion of 'workers' rights' and 'workers' choices'.

Enjoy a thought provoking and enjoyable mix of talks in Term 2.

The project co-ordinates groups involved with the restoration of the Stepping Stones Corridor, and through a strategic approach to rehabilitation, long term community, local government and agency support for the project may be achieved. We will find out how the project relates to the lake's health and Council's and volunteers role in the project. We will also gain a better understanding of riparian areas including creeks, lakes, lagoons and estuaries and how they differ.

## MY NEW GUINEA ADVENTURE

I would like to tell you my experiences as a young bride, living in Port Moresby, Papua. During WWII I was a pen-friend of my future husband, and when he came on leave to Sydney we met, fell in love, and became engaged. After he was de-mobbed he went back to Papua (where he had been born and lived for most of his life) and commenced a career with the Government. After a few months I flew to Moresby, and we were married there.

I had a houseboy named Be-Hai and as he spoke very little English and I didn't speak his native language, we had many hilarious conversations in the form of charades. Just about every day I would attempt to tell him what I would like him to do in the house, but I would invariably end up doing it all myself, as he pretended to not understand. I think he was a wily one and probably told his friends about this silly Sinabada (me), and I guess he was right!

I had led a very sheltered life in a Sydney suburb, so this was considered a rather adventurous thing to do in 1947. The mode of transport was mostly jeeps left over from the war, and I thought it was just great

being driven by a native driver three miles into town to do my shopping. Actually, it was quite hair-raising as he gleefully drove us as close to the edge of the road as he could, with a drop of many metres to the water.

Speaking of water, my first adventure was at a picnic a few miles out of Moresby at a river, and armed with picnic basket a few of us set out to enjoy a day of swimming and eating. We'd been cavorting in the water for quite a while when a shout from the bank told us to get out of there quick-smart as someone had been taken by a crocodile a few weeks before. So we all headed for the bank very fast and headed out of there in case it was lurking about on the bank.

Coincidentally, my next adventure also concerned water and yet another picnic, this time to a local Island, which looked very close to the mainland, but was in fact a few nautical miles away. We hired a lackatoi, which was really just a raft-catamaran sort of craft with a couple of sails, and with the two native owners to sail it, off we went to our tropical paradise for the day. The island was beautiful and we swam in crystal clear turquoise water with beautiful tropical fish swimming around us. No thought of sharks of course. After a few hours in this exotic place we noticed the weather was clouding over and thought we'd better head for the mainland. All went well for a while and we were about halfway home when the storm hit, and tropical storms are really something to see. The sea became very rough and we had to hang on like grim death to avoid being tossed overboard from this very flimsy craft. The native boys were wonderful and somehow managed to get us all ashore eventually, but it was a really terrifying experience.

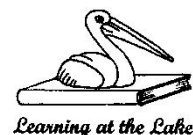
On to a much more pleasant event. Just after the war American warships used to call into Moresby quite regularly and we residents became very excited whenever we saw one coming into the harbour. "Pictures tonight" we would call to each other, and off we'd go in the evening armed with fold-up chairs which we placed on the wharf, waiting for the Americans to set up a large screen on deck and show the latest movies. How romantic, sitting under the moon and very bright stars watching our favourite movie stars. After the show we were all invited on board for supper on the deck, and they were just great evenings, and, even better, it didn't cost us a penny, as like most young newlyweds, money was pretty scarce.

We eventually came home and settled down to suburban life in Sydney, raised two children, and later retired to the Central Coast.

I have many memories of my New Guinea life; back in 1947 it was a very laid-back, pleasant and rather exotic place to be. I learned a lot about life and people during my time there, and wouldn't have missed my experience of living there for all the tea in China.
